How to Implement OER as an Institution

Measure Success by Outcomes, Not Actions

- Number of students using OER
- Percentage of student population using OER
- Number of faculty using OER
- Student success metrics

Focus on Scale

Focus on high enrollment courses where student impact can be the greatest.

Start with Easy Wins

Focus on already-developed OER to start impacting students as soon as possible.

Designate a Leader

Designate a single person as responsible for the success of the initiative.

Implement Multiple Approches

Use a variety of strategies and incentives to reach and encourage adoption.

Involve Everyone

Involve everyone, including senior administrators, faculty, librarians, the bookstore, instructional designers, students, etc.

Protect Academic Freedom

Switching to OER should be a choice, not a requirement.

Specific Strategies

Complete no less than eight of these or other strategies.

Show Support

• Demonstrate high level support for OER through advocacy from a senior administrator's office, including distributing information on OER training days.

• Ask your Student Government Association to get involved and show support to faculty who adopt OER.

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• Host OER training sessions or webinars and incorporate these sessions into existing training days when possible.

• Give presentations at department meetings. Give an overview of OER and provide a list of quality OER in the department's subject areas.

• Encourage faculty to participate actively in presentations by asking them to access an OER book on their devices.



Incentivize

• Provide dedicated instructional design and library support time for faculty who adopt OER.

• Offer adoption grants. Focus on high enrollment courses and easily adoptable books to have the most impact.

• Reward faculty in evaluations and tenure decisions for incorporating innovative teaching techniques, such as the use of OER.

🖰 Try It

• Ask faculty to review just one chapter to start.

• Ask department chairs and your faculty senate for suggestions of innovative faculty members who might pilot an OER textbook in one or all of their courses.

• Encourage faculty to recommend an OER textbook as an additional resource or study aid for their courses.

• Purchase physical versions of OER textbooks to show as visuals during presentations and to create displays.

📫 Testimonials

• Feature faculty advocates of OER who use open content in their courses. Ask them to speak at conferences and other events about OER and to encourage other faculty to adopt.

• Feature testimonials from students who have benefited from using OER.
